

Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship

Reflecting on my experience in music ministry

From *Sing to the Lord*:

8. The Paschal hymn, of course, does not cease when a liturgical celebration ends. Christ, whose praises we have sung, remains with us and leads us through church doors to the whole world, with its joys and hopes, griefs and anxieties.¹⁸ The words Jesus chose from the book of Isaiah at the beginning of his ministry become the song of the Body of Christ. “The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord.”¹⁹

9. Charity, justice, and evangelization are thus the normal consequences of liturgical celebration. Particularly inspired by sung participation, the body of the Word Incarnate goes forth to spread the Gospel with full force and compassion. . . .

What is Evangelization?:

1. To bring about in all Catholics such an enthusiasm for their faith that, in living their faith in Jesus, they freely share it with others. [Starts with our own enthusiasm!]
2. To invite all people . . . whatever their social or cultural background, to hear the message of salvation in Jesus Christ so they may come to join us in the fullness of the Catholic faith. [Welcoming others]
3. To foster gospel values in our society, promoting the dignity of the human person, the importance of the family, and the common good of our society . . . transformed by the saving power of Jesus Christ. [Living the Gospel, Justice, and Charity]
